## WHAT TO DO WITH ROAD KILL DEER

Residents of Pennsylvania are permitted to pick up any deer that was struck and killed [RKD] on our roadways. The only requirement when doing so is that they call our office and secure a permit within 24 hours of picking up the deer.

Since Oneida Township is outside of the Disease Management Area (DMA) at this time, there are no restrictions on the movement of the deer once it's picked up.

High risk parts of a deer killed within DMA cannot be taken outside of the DMA.

Persons who pick up an RKD must consume the deer at their residence. They are not permitted to give any of the meat away. When you call for the permit, you may be instructed to keep the head and hide for a few days so our officers can come and pick them up.

**Within the township, our officers do pick deer up on township roads. PennDOT has the responsibility for removing deer struck on state roads.**

Persons who come upon an injured deer are not permitted to dispatch the animal. They must call our office or the Pennsylvania State Police to have the animal humanely euthanized.

While we understand people not wanting the animal to suffer, liability concerns are the main reason we cannot authorize a citizen to shoot an animal along a roadway.
