SEPTEMBER WAS NATIONAL PREPAREDNESS MONTH. THIS YEAR'S THEME WAS:

"DON'T WAIT. COMMUNICATE. MAKE YOUR EMERGENCY PLAN TODAY."

Some things to consider:

A radio is still handy in an emergency.

Confirm your mobile device can receive Wireless Emergency Alerts. It does not require downloading an app or subscribing to a service.

Sign up for text and/or email alerts from local agencies such as the police department, fire department and emergency management agencies (EMA)

Consider getting an NOAA weather radio for continuous weather information.

Create a list of all alert systems available to you and make sure all members of the household receive the alerts.

TIPS FOR KEEPING IN TOUCH:

Complete contact cards which include address and phone number for every member of the household to be kept with them at all times.

Make sure your child's day care or school has an identification plan as part of their emergency plan.

Have an out-of-state contact for everyone to notify that they are safe. It might be easier to call out of town depending on the emergency.

Program your contact in your cell phone as your ICE (in case of emergency) contact.

Make sure everyone knows how to text message since it can often get around network disruptions that may cause phones not to work.
